"Why not come and chat with me," said the Grasshopper, "instead of working every day?"


"I am helping to lay up food for the winter," said the Ant, "and will you to do the same?"

Thus joined together, the frog led his friend towards the pool in which he lived. When he reached the pool, he suddenly jumped in. He dragged the mouse too in with him.


The frog enjoyed the water and swam croaking about as if he had done a very clever thing.
