		(ii) Common reasons or sources of a headache can range from prolonged stretches of driving,				
		sitting, typing or working on computer screens, etc.				
		(iii) Migraine headaches affect one side of the head whereas a normal headache affects the				
		whole area of the head <b>OR</b> In a headache, pain originates from the brain but in a migraine the				
		pain originates from the irritated nerves of muscles, blood vessel sand bones				
		(iv) Migraines are triggered by chocolates, caffeine, smoking, or even by certain food items				
		<b>OR</b> A shift in the level of body hormones, chemicals, certain foods and drinks and				
		environmental stress can trigger migraine
