	<b>7.a</b>	<p><b>Whitman’s ode to animals is merely a yearning for a simpler life. Do you agree? Justify your answer.</b></p> <p>‘The poet, Walt Whitman in the poem ‘Animals’ justifies the given statement. In the poem, animals are compared to human beings to highlight the differences between them. On the basis of their characteristics of happiness, equality, <b>simplicity and many more ‘tokens’</b>, animals have been ranked much superior and nobler to humans. The poet explains his belief by stating that <b>animals are simple creatures who never complain about their situations</b>. It is true that the key to happiness is ‘Do not complain but accept the situation. <b>They have accepted their natural surroundings and thus, are happy and satisfied with their lives</b>. Humans, on the other hand, have never accepted nature. They are always complaining about it and so, try to change it. Thus, they lead an unhappy life. The play makes fun of their tendency to marry for economic gain rather than love.</p> <p>Marriage seen as a social necessity – marriage for social status and economic stability – society pays no heed to love, romance, passion, emotion and personal desires - Primarily agricultural society – owning a land is of great importance – therefore argument over the Oxen Meadows – proud of huge wealth – fight over the comparative superiority of Guess and Squeezer - For a girl to get married is of great importance – father too feels relieved</p>	4
