17	<b><u>Any three differences between NCM &amp; CDM:</u></b> 1. NCM was launched in 1921 to 1922, while the CDM was launched in 1930 to 1934. 2. The I World War, Rowlatt Act, Jallianwala Bagh incidents were the main events leading to the NCM, while the Great Economic Depression, failure of the Simon Commission and the rejection of Gandhiji's eleven demands were the factors responsible for the launching of CDM. 3. In the NCM, people were asked not to cooperate with British in the hope that British rule in India would collapse and Swaraj would come. But in the CDM, people were asked not only to refuse cooperation with the British but also to break colonial laws such as Salt law.	3

In those regions of Europe where the aristocracy still enjoyed power, peasants struggled under the burden of feudal dues and obligations.</p> <p>4. The rise of food prices or a year of bad harvest led to widespread pauperism in town and country.</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><b>OR</b></p> <p><b><u>Culture played an important role in creating the idea of the nation: (Page- 13-15)</u></b></p> <p><b><u>(Any three relevant points with examples)</u></b></p> <p>1. Romantic artists and poets generally criticized the glorification of reason and science and focused instead on emotions, intuition and mystical feelings. Their effort was to create a sense of a shared collective heritage, a common cultural past, as the basis of a nation.</p> <p>2. Romanticism and cultural movements in Greece helped in developing the feeling of nationalism, sense of togetherness and love for the country through language, art, poetry, stories, folk songs, music and the past experiences. <b>(Examples from Germany to be mentioned).</b></p> <p>3. Karol Kurpinski, celebrated the national struggle through his operas and music, turning folk dances like the polonaise and mazurka into nationalist symbols. <b>(Examples from Poland to be mentioned).</b></p> <p>4. Polish were fighting with Russia for their culture and language.</p>

Political parties are goal oriented and they put forward their main programmes, policies in their manifesto.</p> <p>B. To capture power is the main aim of political parties for which they contest elections through peaceful and constitutional means.</p> <p>C. Political parties promote national interest before their party interest.</p> <p>D. Uphold the constitution and agree to the fundamental principles that binding the nation together.</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><b>OR</b></p> <p><b><u>National Political Parties:</u></b></p> <p>They have their units in various states. But by and large, all these units follow the same policies, programmes and strategy that is decided at the national level. <b>(1 Mark)</b></p> <p><b><u>The conditions required to be a National Political Party:</u></b></p> <p>A party that secures at least six per cent of the total votes in Lok Sabha elections or Assembly elections in four States and wins at least four seats in the Lok Sabha is recognised as a national party. <b>(1 Mark)</b></p> <p><b><u>Any two National Political Parties: (<math>\frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{2} = 1</math> Mark)</u></b></p>	3
20	<p><b><u>Two special steps taken by government of India to attract foreign companies to invest in India. (Any other relevant points with explanations –(<math>1\frac{1}{2} + 1\frac{1}{2} = 3</math>))</u></b></p> <p>1. Industrial zones, called <b>Special Economic Zones (SEZs)</b>, are being set up. SEZs are to have world class facilities: electricity, water, roads, and transport, and storage, recreational and educational facilities. Companies who set up production units in the SEZs do not have to pay taxes for an initial period of five years.</p> <p>2. Government has also allowed <b>flexibility</b> in the labour laws to attract foreign investment. The companies in the organised sector have to obey certain rules that aim to protect the workers' rights. Instead of hiring workers on a regular basis, companies hire workers '<b>flexibly</b>' for short periods when there is intense pressure of work. This is <b>done</b> to reduce the cost of labor for the company. Foreign companies <b>are</b> demanding more flexibility in labor laws.</p>	3

	<p>three sectors in GDP, a similar shift has not taken place in employment. The primary sector continues to be the largest employer.</p> <p>2. It is because not enough jobs were created in the secondary and tertiary sectors. Even though industrial output or the production of goods went up by more than nine times during the period, employment in the industry went up by around three times.</p> <p>3. The same applies to tertiary sector as well. While production in the service sector rose by more than 14 times, employment in the service sector rose around five times.</p>

(1 Mark)</p> <p><b>The following were the changes brought about in Europe by the Vienna Congress in 1815. (Any 4 relevant points – 4 Marks – Page- 11)</b></p> <p>1. The Bourbon dynasty, which had been deposed during the French Revolution, was restored to power, and France lost the territories it had annexed under Napoleon.</p>	5

	<p>2. A series of states were set up on the boundaries of France to prevent French expansion in future. Thus the kingdom of the Netherlands, which included Belgium, was set up in the north and Genoa was added to Piedmont in the south.</p> <p>3. Prussia was given important new territories on its western frontiers, while Austria was given control of northern Italy.</p> <p>4. But the German confederation of 39 states that had been set up by Napoleon was left untouched.</p> <p>5. 28	<p><b>Any five (both positive and negative impacts) points with explanations:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. MNCs have <b><u>increased their investments</u></b> in India over the past 20 years, as they understood that investing in India has been beneficial for them and also they are interested in industries such as cell phones, automobiles, electronics, soft drinks, fast food or services such as banking in urban areas because they have a large number of well-off buyers, new jobs have been created. And also provided raw materials supplied by the local companies to these MNCs have prospered.</li> <li>2. Several of the <b>top Indian companies</b> have been benefited from the increased competition by investing in newer technology, production methods and raising their production standards. Some have gained from successful collaborations with foreign companies.</li> <li>3. Globalization has enabled <b><u>some large Indian companies to emerge as multinationals themselves</u></b> like Tata Motors (automobiles), Infosys (IT), Ranbaxy (medicines), which are spreading worldwide</li> <li>4. Globalization has also created <b><u>new opportunities for companies</u></b> providing services, particularly those involving IT. The Indian company producing a magazine for the London based company and call centers are some examples. Besides, a host of services such as data entry, accounting, administrative tasks, and engineering are now being done cheaply in countries such as India and are exported to the developed countries.</li> </ol> <p><b><u>Negative impact</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Small producers and workers globalization has posed major challenge. Small manufactures have been hit hard due to competition. Several units shut down rendering many workers jobless.</li> <li>2. Competition and uncertain employment – globalization and pressure of competition have made the workers job insecure.</li> <li>3. The large MNC look for cheapest goods in order to cut their labour cost.</li> </ol> <p style="text-align: center;"><b>OR</b></p> <p><b>How can the government ensure that globalization is fair and its benefits are shared in a better way by all? At least one-third of all positions are reserved for women.</li> <li>4. Democracy improves the <b>quality of decision making</b>.</li> <li>3. Democracy provides a <b>method to deal with differences and conflicts</b>. India is having diversity of language, religion and cultures. Democracy in India made it possible to keep unity in diversity. In a democracy no one is a permanent winner or loser.</li> <li>4. 	<p><b>Why gaining popularity-Reason:</b> It is light, resistant to corrosion, a good conductor of heat, malleable and becomes strong when it is mixed with other metals. It is used to manufacture aircraft, utensils and wires. It has gained popularity as a substitute of steel, copper, zinc and lead in a number of industries. Manufacturing industries not only help in modernizing agriculture, which forms the backbone of our economy.</li> <li>b. They also reduce the heavy dependence of people on agriculture income by providing them jobs in secondary and tertiary sectors.</li> <li>c. Industrial development is a precondition for eradication of unemployment and poverty from our country. This was the main philosophy behind public sector industries and joint sector ventures in India.
